

## Activities

### Rainy Day Retell

Determining the main topic and supporting details is key to reading nonfiction text. Help students discover the relationship between a topic, main idea, and supporting details using an umbrella as a prop. Gather index cards or sentence strips, markers, string, and tape. Encourage readers to identify a random one-word topic, a one or two sentence main idea, and several details that support the main idea. Record their ideas on the cards or sentence strips. Once the writing is complete, tape the topic to the very top of the umbrella, the main idea to the body of the umbrella, and hang the supporting details from the strings. Next, identify the main idea and details of Jonas Hanway's Scurrilous, Scandalous, Shockingly, Sensational Umbrella. Then readers can apply what they have learned to other books that they are reading. This engaging visual will help readers see that the main topic and the main idea are what holds the story together, while the details rain down from the central ideas. This activity is perfect for a whole group lesson or as a small group cooperative activity.

#### Awesome Alliteration

Beginning with the title of the book, Josh Crute entertains readers with alliteration. His fun use of words adds drama to the story and helps the reader enjoy a playful tone while learning about a real life influencer. Encourage students to play with words and create tone in their writing. Have them begin by brainstorming word lists for letters of the alphabet. For example, ask writers to think of as many words as they can that begin with the letter "b" (bright, bold, beautiful, billion, bashful, best, bust, break, better, bubbles, etc.). Encourage students to bring their home life into the classroom by adding words that connect



to their culture, their family or other life experiences. Do this a few times with a few different letters. Then, writers can take these words and create an alliteration alphabet mini book. Each page can focus on a letter. More advanced readers can challenge themselves by using rich, more complex vocabulary and creative artwork to engage their readers. Once students have written the text, they can illustrate the page. This is a great activity to be done individually or in small groups. When the pages are finished they can be bound together to make an amazing alphabet alliteration book. Share these books with young readers by donating them to a local preschool, hospital, or shelter. This project is sure to be a crowd pleaser!

Jonas Hanway's legacy was letter writing and persuasion. Encourage writers to follow in his footsteps!
